
THE HEADLINE

How do QR codes work?

You can scan the QR code on a device, like a smartphone or tablet. The new updates on iPhone allow you to simply scan using the camera, however you may need to download a QR reader, like Qrafter, for free from the app store. The QR codes within this newsletter will direct you to further information or even videos that the pupils have produced.

RTRADE FORTNIGHT

As part of our Global Development work, we have enjoyed taking part in Fairtrade This year we concentrated on Fairtrade products and where they come from. Some classes looked at the chocolate trade and some looked at the journey of bananas, whilst some used the price of fair trade products and the wages given to farmers to produce Fortnight. A few years ago we managed to achieve the first level Fairtrade Award by ensuring that the sugar, tea and cocoa powder purchased in school is from fair trade sources. some great maths work. Our pupils were very keen to learn about Fairtrade. They enjoyed learning about the provenance of products and about the importance of keeping wages fair so that others in the world can access some of the things we sometimes take for granted such as a home,

education and a reliable health system.

Stories from Other Cultures

In Primary, our current Elements topic is Stories from Other Cultures. As it was the celebration of the Chinese New Year at the start of term, Class 3 began by looking at the story behind the Chinese zodiac. Pupils read and discussed the legend before acting it out wearing masks to represent all the 13 animals, including the cat who didn't quite make it to the zodiac.



Following on from this, we studied the story of The Two Doves which is used as the inspiration for the famous 'Willow Pattern' plate design. Pupils produced a cartoon strip version of the story with twists of their own

The last story to be studied is the Hindu fable of Rama and Sita. Pupils will produce a play script and act out the story in class.

CIRCUSOLOG Visits Key Stage 3

As a 'wow' way in to the Circus theme within our Elements curriculum, Key stage 3 had a visit from Alex and the Circusology team to teach us a number of skills. This included juggling, unicycling, plate spinning and balancing. Pupils have created some fantastic writing around circuses this half term and have been exploring the treatment of people who performed in Freak shows during the 19th Century.

Superheroes in Key Stage 3

We all like Spiderman, Captain America and Wonder Woman, however, KS3 pupils were privileged to have a visit from a different kind of hero this term.

Years 7, 8 and 9 had a visit from real life heroes in February. Corporal Winter and his friend brought equipment and medals for pupils to look at. They told us all about their brave duties in Afghanistan, their jobs in this country and their experiences of saving people during conflicts. They were real role models for us all, inspirational and we are grateful for all they do

Key Stage 3 have thoroughly enjoyed exploring super heroes and real life heroes. They have discussed and explored questions around what qualities and attributes can be attached to heroes. As mentioned, they looked at the brave work of our armed forces and emergency services, as well as thinking about who we have looked up to and admired throughout our lives. Year 9 held an awards ceremony for "Inspirational person of the Year" and wrote speeches to persuade people to vote for our chosen heroes.
