

Pupils in Primary 4 imagined that they had been sent away to a concentration camp, they then wrote letter to send home.

Primary KS2 have been learning about the terrible Tudors this half term as part of the elements curriculum. They have covered many aspects of the Tudor times including the Battle of Bosworth, Henry VIII and his 6 wives, Tudor punishments, housing, clothing and even the Great Plague that killed millions of people!

Primary have been lucky enough to visit Bishops House in Sheffield to take a peek through a window into the past.

### **Creative Writing at Dearne AA**

Year 10 and 11 students at Dearne AA have been looking at World War II to practise their creative writing skills. Stories and pictures about the war seem to have really fired up their imaginations. We watched episodes of Carrie's War, a programme about two children being evacuated from London, read extracts from the book of the same name and looked at photographs from the war. One photograph shows young evacuees at a train station; another shows troops arriving at a beach, under fire. The students were asked to write a description or story based upon the scenes in these pictures.

We were all very impressed with the use of ambitious vocabulary and the way that the students used their imaginations to envisage and detail what the photographs don't show; the sound of the fighting, the raw emotions of the people caught up in the war and the horror they experienced. Excellent preparation for English Language GCSE.
