

Pupils listened to and analysed song lyrics from the 1980s and then wrote their own song making a political or social statement about what is happening in the world now.

Pupils have also learnt about Margaret Thatcher and the miners' strike; particularly the Battle of Orgreave. As part of this we invited an ex miner (Miss Dixon's Dad) to come and talk to us about his experience of the strike. Pupils have also been working with Claire from Open Minds and have used dramatic techniques to help them with their writing. Pupils have read the Secret Diary of Adrian Mole and have written their own diary entry from the perspective of a miner or policeman at the Battle of Orgreave.



At Springwell we love to use technology in our learning. You may notice a number of these strange looking square codes throughout this newsletter. They are QR codes and can be scanned to get information. The QR codes in this newsletter will direct you to films that our pupils have produced.

#### How do QR codes work?

You can scan the QR code on a device, like a smartphone or tablet. You need to make sure you have a QR reader, like Qrafter, for free from the app store. The QR codes within this newsletter will direct you to further information or even videos that the pupils have produced.

As part of our key stage 2 elements curriculum we visited Conisbrough Castle in Doncaster to see what a real life castle would have been like 800 years ago. We were fortunate enough to be able to explore the castle grounds and learned what life was like for the people living there. In the afternoon we looked at some artefacts from around the time the castle was in full operation including money, kitchen utensils, musical instruments and even weapons and armour worn by the knights who defended it! The most exciting part of the day was being allowed into the keep, which was the living headquarters for the lords and ladies. The views from the top of the keep were truly breath taking!

#### THE MINERS' STRIKE OF 1984

As part of the *Elements* topic, The 80s, Year 7 have been learning facts about the miners' strike. The strike started in 1984 at Cortonwood Colliery. It soon became wide spread over the country and it lasted for a year. During this time, miners were on strike and refused to go to work as a boycott of the closure of the pits. There were some tragic moments during the miners' strike, especially the Battle of Orgreave. There were only 6 pits that remained open after the strike, compared to the initial 174.





In our class pupils looked at books and artefacts from miners. They felt how heavy a Davy lamp was, understood why it had to be used in mines and they appreciated how difficult the conditions must have been underground for miners. They also found a lot of local history in some books very kindly lent to us by Mr Taylor.

This topic has certainly generated a lot of discussions and has fascinated the children in year 7.



Music at Springwell has become a culture in itself. From children coming to play music before their school day starts, at lunchtime and after school to children passing qualifications, Composing, performing in concerts and teaching other children and even staff.

Children thrive and become involved in this thing that has an impact on most people's lives. Children who struggle to read can learn to read music, which is something most adults can't do. Children who previously had little self-esteem find themselves on stage playing or singing to an audience. Children who have found it difficult to work with their peers find themselves playing in a band and children who felt no purpose find a place in the world of 'Musos'.

Every day there are children in the school, expressing themselves through this magical, human phenomenon. No one can explain why we love it so much. Children develop their growth mind set when learning how to play an instrument and they develop resilience when they practise. They also learn to appreciate each other's talents and encourage and support each other in the classroom.

We are looking forward to our concert on 7<sup>th</sup> April and I currently have 25 children on the list to perform.
