#### Sensory Interventions at Springwell

Our senses provide us with a means of understanding and interacting with the world around us.

Some people, like many of the pupils at Springwell, have difficulties processing the sensory input their brains receive. This can be a particular difficulty for pupils on the autistic spectrum, people with certain learning difficulties and for those who may have experienced the world in different ways. Sometimes this can look like challenging behaviour. However with carefully planned activities and a personalised sensory diet, people with sensory processing difficulties can learn to manage how they react to certain sensory stimulus. Addressing sensory issues could result in increased engagement with the curriculum and therefore improved learning experiences; along with greater opportunities for engagement in both school and non-school activities.

#### Our Aims...



To support our young people to learn to recognise how their bodies respond to the sensory information they receive and equip them with strategies to help them to stay regulated, even when under stress.



To provide an adapted environment and personalised teaching programme that addresses individuals' sensory needs and requirements in order to impact positively on their health, wellbeing and ability to access further learning.

To help regulate their sensory systems, the young people at Springwell engage in a variety of activities, using the specialised equipment to either alert or calm their sensory system.



Key stage 3 have had a busy term learning about Julius Caesar and the Romans. Pupils have been taking an active role in learning what it was like to be part of the Roman life, putting on Roman costumes, sampling Roman foods and creating fantastic Roman equipment. We started the topic with a visit from James Swallow Gaunt and his fencing group. The pupils got to experience what it would be like to be involved in a fencing match using the equipment and having matches against each other. The highlight of the term was pupils working with Claire from Open Minds to create the school production of William Shakespeare's Julius Caesar. A big thank you to all the pupils, staff members, parents and carers who took part and came to watch the production

#### Parent Council

Pupils in KS3 have had a visit from the Refugee Council this term. Sarah and Ben came to talk to us about what it feels like to have to leave your country suddenly, travel with very little possessions and live with the knowledge you can never go back. This is what happened to Ben who had to flee the Republic of Congo after expressing the fact he did not agree with some of the President's decisions.

Ben arrived in England as a refugee and is in the process of seeking asylum rights. He knows he can never go back and see his family and friends again. Ben and Sarah explained to us that being an asylum seeker is difficult, stressful and painful. We were all very grateful they took the time to talk to us and gave us some insight into homelessness and survival, which are the two topics we are doing this term.

#### **FOOTBALL**



### Victorian Working Children

Our Elements topic in Primary last half term was Victorian Working Children. Part of the work focused on child miners. Barnsley pits employed lots of young people and in July 1838 there was a tragic accident at the Huskar Pit in Silkstone that claimed the lives of 27 children. All 4 primary classes visited Silkstone Church to view the monument and see the beautiful commemorative stained glass window; both landmarks remember the tragedy and the sad loss of

Additionally, pupils researched other highly dangerous jobs that children from poor Victorian families did. These included chimney sweeps, watercress sellers, mud larks, powder monkeys and mule scavengers in cotton mills.

We also visited the National Coalmining Museum in Wakefield where the children experienced first-hand, the conditions faced by child miners.
