Forest School

Here at Springwell Learning Community, Forest Schools isn't a badge or a place, but a philosophy and an ethos where students work outside to build creativity and confidence, self-esteem and gain transferable skills for all learners to take with them.

The ethos of Forest School is based on a fundamental respect for children and young people, and for their capacity to instigate, test and maintain curiosity in the world around them. It believes in children's right to play: the right to access the outdoors (and in particular a woodland environment); the right to access risk and the vibrant reality of the natural world; and the right to experience a healthy range of emotions, through all the challenges of social interaction, to build a resilience that will enable continued and creative engagement with their peers and their potential.

In November, the pupils at Springwell Special Academy were set the challenge by Mrs Dale and Year 7 class to complete as many random acts of kindness as possible towards the staff, pupils and visitors they come into contact with every day. Each day the pupils were asked to vote for pupils who had shown them kindness with a reason explaining what they had done and how it had made them feel. This culminated in the creation of the Springwell Kindness Tree and a celebration Assembly to acknowledge the kindness champions and overall kindest class award. The week was a great success and we hope to continue to keep making Springwell Special Academy a kinder place to be.

Understanding QR Codes

You may notice a number of these strange looking square codes throughout this newsletter. They are QR codes and can be scanned to get information. They can contain images, links to websites, sounds, numbers and messages.

How do QR codes work?

You can scan the QR code on a device, like a smartphone or tablet. You need to make sure you have a QR reader, like Qrafter, for free from the app store. The QR codes within this newsletter will direct you to further information or even videos that the pupils have produced.

- 1. Open the QR reader
- 2. Point it at the QR code
- 3. Scan it and the link will open. Easy!

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD

At the start of the year Kendray Key Stage 4 began working towards completing their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award. In order to complete the award every registered student is required to undertake 3 to 6 months of an activity from a skills section, physical section and 12 hours of volunteering within the community. Students will also have the opportunity to complete an expedition at the end of the award which includes one night of camping. Recently our students completed 12 miles of cycling in a round trip from Penistone to Dunford Bridge along the Trans Pennine Trial. The ride took around an hour to complete, stopping off to look at points of interest on the way. The students are hoping to complete some of their 12 hours of volunteering with the Trans Pennine Trial maintenance team who help maintain the trial and keep it usable for the public.
