Our Core Day

To improve pupil engagement and support the further development of our curriculum, we would like to share some proposed changes to the structure of our school day. Springwell Alternative Academy has been involved in innovative work with South Yorkshire Police Violence Reduction Unit. Kerry Ann bid for money which was used to facilitate more home visits to vulnerable students' homes which helped build relationships with parents and carers. There has been an increase in referrals to outside agencies which reflects a greater willingness on the part of students and carers to engage. There has been an increase in intelligence which has helped reduce violence in the community. Kerry Ann managed a group discussion on CCE which was well received by students. Attendance in the AA has had a 5% spike and now is consistently above 70% which is fantastic! At the end of it students and staff enjoyed a well- deserved trip bowling.







Key stage two have had a lot of fun learning about Ancient Egypt for their Element's topic this half term.
